## **Speaking Topic Overview**

Formal education and practical training in preparing for ministry has helped many meet the basic requirements for a leadership appointment required by most denominations and fellowships.

However, studies<sup>1</sup> indicate that most pastors and ministers feel they are inadequately prepared for the many challenges in leadership and shepherding God's flock. It is heart breaking to see so many in leadership quit, and what is even more troubling is the frequent news headlines of pastors and ministry leaders falling from grace, become embroiled in public scandal.

Reviewing Scripture, we see how Christ prepared and trained his disciples and followers (including the Apostle Paul) for the difficulties of leadership in ministering His Gospel. We refer to this training as Christ's School of Ministry. This school is encountered in everyday life, where the sincere follower of Christ becomes equipped for ministry through the discipline of the Lord.

This two-hour presentation lays out Christ's harder teachings that few in leadership embrace, where the old nature becomes crucified and the call of God comes to fruition. Pastor Pretlow shares from his own years of wilderness training in the discipline of the Lord, and how Christ's School of Ministry truly equips the bondservant of Christ for ministry.
